II Duties, responsibilities and Output Expectations

General

Bangladesh is among the countries with the highest under nutrition rates in the world. Both chronic and acute under nutrition, as well as anemia, are above or close to emergency thresholds: Close to two million children are wasted and close to 8 million children are stunted. Among the multi-faceted causes of under nutrition household food insecurity, disease and inappropriate infant & young child feeding practices are key contributing factors.

WFP Bangladesh has positioned itself more strongly among the key stakeholders in nutrition. WFP is planning to work closely with the Bangladesh Government's National Nutrition Services and scale up its community nutrition component to reach around 350,000 undernourished women and children per year as well as prevent under nutrition of many more.

Under the overall supervision of the Head of Programme and the direct supervision of the Head of Nutrition and in close collaboration with sub-office and other programme section staff, the selected candidate will perform the following tasks after familiarisation with the local context and WFP's policies and strategies:

- Contribute to the implementation of the Bangladesh Country Programme 2012-2016 Component 'Improving Maternal and Child Nutrition' which focuses on preventing and addressing child under-nutrition and its underlying causes in rural areas as well as urban slums of Bangladesh
- Contribute to timely and appropriate programme planning;

- Support communication and follow up with NGO partners and other stakeholders;
- Provide support and guidance to the sub-office office teams in the implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the programme;
- Contribute to managing the programme budget;
- Contribute to the design of innovative nutrition approaches and to designing and reviewing the results of respective baseline and outcome surveys as well as the dissemination of results;
- Ensure programme data from the monitoring system is appropriately analysed, communicated and used for programme improvements;
- Report on programme progress to donors and contribute to WFP standard reporting;
- Share regular lessons learnt and best practices of the programme with various stakeholders;
- Contribute to ensuring the overall alignment of the programme with the Government's approach to the delivery of nutrition services in the country; and
- Contribute to nutrition coordination efforts with key UN agencies, i.e. UNICEF, WHO and FAO.
- Contribute to the country office's learning and knowledge management on nutrition and food security programmes;
- Contribute to working with the private sector on rice fortification and the local production of a tested complementary food supplement to prevent child under nutrition;
- Support strengthening nutrition capacity among WFP staff, NGO partners and government counterparts through providing training and capacity support.

III Training component: Learning elements and expectations

Upon completion of the assignment the JPO will learn:

- WFP's policies and guidance on food and nutrition and how to apply it to projects;
- WFP's corporate reporting system and requirements for nutrition interventions;
- How to manage a WFP maternal and child nutrition programme including planning, monitoring, evaluating, reporting and engaging in partnerships with government, NGOs and other UN agencies;
- How to analyse, manage and communicate nutrition programme information / knowledge.

Expectations

- The JPO has contributed to managing the implementation of the maternal and child nutrition programme from planning to reporting stage in line with WFP's standard practices
- The JPO has contributed to the country office's endeavour to strengthen the programme

- Previous exposure to WFP, UNICEF, WHO or FAO work related to nutrition is an advantage
